INFORMATION: The Trustees of the City of Columbia Employees' Retirement Plan Fund annually submit reports to the City Council regarding the City Retirement Plan and the Retirement Health Insurance Post-Employment Benefit Trust. A summary of the revenues, expenditures and balance for the City of Columbia Employee's Retirement Plan Fund is being provided from the inception of the plan on July 1, 1974, through December 31, 2024, and a summary of the revenues, expenditures and the balance of the City of Columbia, Tennessee Retirement Health Insurance Post-Employment Benefit Trust, opened August 8, 2008, through December 31, 2024. These reports are required by Ordinance to assist the City Council in the fiduciary responsibility for management of pension funds.

7.4. APPROVE CHANGE ORDER NO. 1 WITH MORRISON ENGINEERING, LLC FOR ENGINEERING SERVICES RELATED TO THE CITY OF COLUMBIA PARKING GARAGE REHABILITATION PROJECT WHICH INCREASES THE CONTRACT AMOUNT BY \$2,250 - DEVELOPMENT SERVICES DEPARTMENT.

RECOMMENDATION: Approve.

INFORMATION: City Council approved a contract with Morrison Engineering, LLC on March 10, 2022 in the amount of \$54,580 for engineering services related to the City of Columbia Parking Garage

Rehabilitation Project.

This Change Order addressed engineering services related to additional work to the Police Department and South side of City Hall waterproofing. The work included visual inspection of each area, providing scope of work, receiving and processing change orders for each location, as well as providing project management during the work process. Change Order No. 1 will increase the total contract amount by \$2,250, bringing the total contract sum to \$56,830.

7.5. APPROVE AND AUTHORIZE THE MAYOR TO EXECUTE CHANGE ORDER NO. 1 WITH NICKELL COMPANY, LLC FOR THE CDBG SIDEWALK IMPROVEMENTS WITH A DECREASE IN THE AMOUNT OF \$154,264.98 - WARDS 2 & 3 - DEVELOPMENT SERVICES DEPARTMENT.

RECOMMENDATION: Approve.

INFORMATION: The City of Columbia received "Small Cities" Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program funding for sidewalk improvements along South High Street from West 8th Street to West 11th Street, and along East 8th Street from South Main Street to (west of) South Glade Street. The original contract was approved by Council on April 11th, 2024 in the amount of \$763,314.70. This Change Order is to authorize a decrease from the original contract amount totaling \$154,264.98 due to items not needed during completion. This change order will not extend the project completion date.

7.6. APPROVE THE FY 2024-2025 STREET RESURFACING LIST - WARDS 1, 2, 3, 4, AND 5 - DEVELOPMENT SERVICES DEPARTMENT.

RECOMMENDATION: Approve.

INFORMATION: A list of streets proposed to be paved has been developed using field observations and a Street Database Program. Consideration has been given to streets in all wards of the City in an effort to identify the City's paving needs and to effectively use the available paving funds. This list is tentative and will provide guidance in development of a paving contract. Once bids are received, the paving contract will come before City Council for approval. Contract work will presumably commence.

This \$4 million represents the largest street paving budget for the City of Columbia at any one time and encompasses 19.6 road miles.

7.7. APPROVE BID AWARD TO HAWKINS & PRICE, LLC FOR CONSTRUCTION OF THE CARTERS CREEK FORCE MAIN RELOCATION IN THE AMOUNT OF \$489,755 - WASTEWATER DEPARTMENT.

INFORMATION: The City of Columbia's Wastewater Department requests approval of the bid award to Hawkins & Price, LLC for construction of the Carters Creek Force Main Relocation project in the amount of \$489,755. This would replace and update the force main and air relief valves and provide continued quality service to the citizens of the City of Columbia.

INFORMATION: The City of Columbia's Wastewater Department wants to purchase a 2025 Mini Excavator in the amount of \$56,580.35 for use by our sewer rehab crew where the larger excavator is unable to easily fit on narrow streets to avoid blocking the entire road. This will be purchased through Sourcewell Contract 112624.

7.9. APPROVE AND AUTHORIZE THE MAYOR TO SIGN THE CONTRACT BETWEEN THE CITY OF COLUMBIA AND CUMBERLAND VALLEY CONSTRUCTORS, INC. FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF THE BEAR CREEK PIKE SEWAGE PUMP STATION REPLACEMENT IN THE AMOUNT OF \$5,272,800 - WASTEWATER DEPARTMENT.

RECOMMENDATION: Approve.

INFORMATION: The City of Columbia's Wastewater Department requests the mayor to sign the Contract between the City of Columbia and Cumberland Valley Constructors, Inc. for the construction of the Bear Creek Pike Sewage Pump Station Replacement in the amount of \$5,272,800. The bid award was previously approved by City Council on February 13, 2025.

CERTIFICATION: The Chief Financial Officer certifies that \$5,272,800 is budgeted and unencumbered in Wastewater – Pump Station-Bear Creek PS.

The new tower will replace the existing tower that sustained damage during the May 2024 tornado events. The tower will be installed at 1539 Nicholson Schoolhouse Road. The cost of this item is \$115,875.

7.11. RATIFY THE EMERGENCY REPAIR OF SEWER LINES OF FIRE STATION NO. 4 LOCATED AT 5040 TROTWOOD AVENUE IN THE AMOUNT OF \$55,989 - FIRE & RESCUE.

RECOMMENDATION: Approve.

INFORMATION: Fire Station 4, located on Trotwood Avenue, has been experiencing sewer line problems. It was investigated to find the cause of the problems by Hiller Plumbing, they completed a camera inspection of all the drain lines in the building for proper design and solutions on February 11, 2025. The cost of this phase of the project was \$4,980.

Due to cracked, broken and rotten lines, reline work is necessary on approximately 200 feet of 3" and 4" pipe in the fire station.

The cost of the full sewer line reline project amounts to \$55,989, which includes \$4,980 for camera day.

7.12. APPROVE AND AUTHORIZE THE MAYOR TO SIGN THE NON-EXCLUSIVE USE AND OCCUPANCY PERMIT BETWEEN THE CITY OF COLUMBIA AND THE MAURY COUNTY SCHOOL BOARD OF EDUCATION - PARKS & RECREATION DEPARTMENT.

RECOMMENDATION: Approve.

INFORMATION: The Maury County Board of Education is requesting the renewal of their annual Non-Exclusive Use and Occupancy Permit to utilize various City athletic facilities to host some of the local county schools' sporting events such as baseball, soccer, cross-country and tennis. The facilities are Cook Soccer Park, Woodland Park Tennis Courts; Fairview Park and Babe Ruth Baseball Fields; Ridley Park; Eva Gilbert Softball Fields; and Eva Gilbert Football field. Upon approval, each school will be scheduled for usage pending availability in alliance with any of the approved leagues that may also be using the fields/courts. There will be no fee collected for use of the facilities; however, schools are required to provide their own supplies and equipment to drag and mark the ballfields where applicable and any other program supplies to implement the events. All terms of the agreement are exactly the same as last year.

INFORMATION: The City of Columbia City Manager's Office requests authorization to apply for the Tennessee Department of

Economic and Community Development“Small Cities” Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program.

The CDBG grant funds would support improvements to drainage flow in East Columbia at the intersection of East 9th St. and South Main St., reducing extreme flooding of driveways, roads, and culverts and providing residents and businesses access to key public and private services during extreme weather events. The East 9th St. and South Main St. Drainage Project was identified in the City of Columbia Strategic Plan in 2017.

The maximum funded project is not to exceed \$1,265,823, including state and local funds. If the \$1,000,000 maximum amount is awarded by the Tennessee Department of Economic and Comment Development, the agency will require a local match totaling \$265,823 from the City of Columbia.

Applications are due March 28, 2025. The City should receive information on the status of the city’s application by the fall of 2025.

CERTIFICATION: The Chief Financial Officer certifies that \$1,265,823 will be included in a subsequent appropriation amendment with matching funds reserved in General City Admin – Reserves pending the award of funds.

10 ORDINANCES.

10.1.2ND CONSIDERATION ON ORDINANCE NO. 4536 - AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ORDINANCE NO. 4400, THE SAME BEING THE ZONING ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF COLUMBIA, TENNESSEE BY REPEALING ARTICLE 4 AND REPLACING SUCH ARTICLE WITH NEW ARTICLE 4 BUILDING, LOT AND BUILDING SITE STANDARDS - CITYWIDE - DEVELOPMENT SERVICES DEPARTMENT.

RECOMMENDATION: Approve Ordinance 4536 on second consideration.

INFORMATION: The Department of Development Services is requesting to amend the Article 4 of Zoning Ordinance 4400. The proposed amendments include Uses, Limitations and Standards regarding Home Occupations, Vape, Tobacco, & Cannabinoids, and Bars, Taverns & Nightclubs. The Planning Commission recommended approval of this request with a vote of 6-0 at their December 4, 2024 meeting with the conditions from the Planning Commission recommending:

- That within the Columbia Arts District Overlay the applicant shall demonstrate that no pre-existing place of Worship, School, or Public Park be located within 200 ft. (reduced from 500 ft.) of a proposed bar, tavern, or nightclub.
- That the separation requirement for Tobacco, Vape, and Cannabinoid Retailers be increased from 500 feet to 1,000 feet from an already existing establishment from a new proposed Tobacco,

Vape, and Cannabinoid Retailer, and keep the separation of such newly established retailer from schools, parks, and religious facilities remain at 500 feet and not allowed with a CD-5 district as drafted by Staff.

The Planning Commission reviewed this item at the February 12, 2025 meeting as requested by City Council. No new changes were made to the previously reviewed uses. The Planning Commission recommended the removal of the word "Primary" in relation to required Building Materials in the standards for district tables along with the replacement of Table 4.3.7.A, Private Frontage Types. The recommendation passed by a vote of 6-0.

RECOMMENDATION: Approve Ordinance No. 4540 as amended on second consideration.

INFORMATION: The proposed ordinance is the third amendment to the FY 2025 Appropriation Ordinance, impacting the Capital Projects, Grants, Wastewater and General Fund Departments.

Within this budget amendment, the following items are included:

- Rebudget/transfer \$4,377,973.21 from General to Capital Projects,
- Budget transfer/expenses for Cap Projects totaling \$4,377,973.21,
- Budget Army Core flood mapping study at \$142,500 and Intersection Study at Country Club/Union totaling \$5,500.
- Budget FY 2024 funds due for JAG grant to closeout totaling \$1,915.22,
- Budget Anonymous Donations totaling \$2,245.95 and \$812.19 and Office of Emergency Management incident funding totaling \$648.43,
- Budget capital projects including \$4.3 million for Muletown Rec acquisition, Public Works Building improvements totaling \$69,723.21 and tourism computer equipment totaling \$8,250,
- Reclassify Tourism Enhancement Grant project funds totaling \$75,000,
- Budget \$865,156.88 for 2024 G.O. Bonds interest related to new debt issued for the new WWTP project.

Included on second consideration, the following items are:

- Budget transfers to capital projects and grants totaling \$830,139 and \$123,175 respectively,
- Budget funds received from sales of seized weapons totaling \$21,152,
- Budget Training Reserves totaling \$400 in Fire,
- Budget Mid-State Classic even budget from ticket sales and

sponsorships totaling \$45,000,

- Budget funds to reline sewer line at Station No. 4 (\$55,989), CO #1 for parking garage renovations (\$2,250), a tanker fire truck (\$468,100) and additional amount needed for mast arm replacements (\$303,800),
- Budget project budget for downtown improvement grant totaling \$300,000,
- Budget \$115,875 for Hazzard Mitigation Grant to replace Radio Tower,
- Budget additional project expenses for Ducker River Pump Station (\$813,000) and Bear Creek Pump Station (\$4,595,300)
- Budget funds for Wastewater portion of ESRI ArcGIS software expense totaling \$19,850.

A detailed schedule of items included within this budget amendment is attached. This amendment increases the City's total budget for FY 2025 by \$17,481,255 to \$223,934,133.

City Council took this matter into consideration on January 9, 2025 and referred the item back to Planning Commission for further review and recommendation at the February 12, 2025 meeting.

*Planning Commission reviewed the request on February 12, 2025, and recommended the removal of the limited use standard (PL) of owner occupied in the currently allowed zoning districts for Short Term Rental Use. This allows the use in the CD-4, 4C, 5 and 5C districts. The accessory use table was left as originally recommended to council with the majority of districts allowing the use outright and/or through the conditional use process. This recommendation was approved by a vote of six to zero.
