- 1. PUBLIC HEARING ON ORDINANCE NO. 4476 (AS AMENDED) (RELATES TO ITEM 10.2) – AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE FISCAL YEAR 2023-2024 BUDGET ORDINANCE NO. 4464, PROVIDING FOR REVISIONS TO THE GENERAL, STATE STREET AID, DRUG, SANITATION, CAPITAL PROJECTS, AND WASTEWATER FUNDS - FINANCE.**

RECOMMENDATION: Conduct the public hearing.

INFORMATION: This public hearing is related to item 10.2 on the agenda. The proposed ordinance is the first amendment of the FY 2024 Appropriation Ordinance and revises the General, State Street Aid, Drug Fund, Capital Projects and Wastewater Funds.

Supporting documentation for the amendment is included within the agenda packet and the required Notice of Public Hearing was published in The Daily Herald on September 17, 2023.

This amendment increases the City's total budget for FY 2024 by \$20,490,763 from \$80,438,968 to \$100,929,732.

- 2. RECOMMENDATION: Conduct the Public Hearing.

INFORMATION: The applicant is requesting to modify the Planned Unit Development Master Plan by altering Building "A" with an additional building story. The building will consist of one commercial floor on the ground with two floors of residential above. The three-story proposal will keep in rhythm with the surrounding structures. The Architectural Design Review Team approved this item at the December 2022 meeting with conditions. The Planning Commission reviewed this request at the August 9, 2023 meeting and recommended approval with a vote of six to

zero. The required notice of Public Hearing was advertised September 26, 2023 in The Daily Herald and September 27, 2023 in Main Street Maury.

RECOMMENDATION: Approve and authorize the disposal of surplus equipment as listed on the attachment per policy as defined within the City of Columbia Purchasing Manual.

INFORMATION: Various items have been identified by the department as surplus. An attempt will be made to sell all items at public auction. The value of those not sold will be reassessed and disposed of as prescribed by City policy.

7.3. APPROVE THE BID AWARD AND AUTHORIZE THE MAYOR TO EXECUTE A CONTRACT WITH WAYNES PEST CONTROL FOR PEST CONTROL SERVICES IN THE AMOUNT OF \$12,000 - FINANCE.

RECOMMENDATION: Approve.

INFORMATION: The City has contracted with a single vendor to provide pest control services for a number of years. The current contract with Waynes Pest Control, previously Kirkland Pest Control, is set to expire; therefore, bids were solicited. Twenty-one city-owned facilities were included in the solicitation. Vendors were required to provide quarterly service to all facilities for the control of crawling and flying insects as well as rodent control. Only one

vendor responded to the request for bids and that was Waynes Pest Control.

CERTIFICATION: The Chief Financial Officer certifies that \$12,000 is budgeted and unencumbered in Other Services in the Wastewater, Sanitation and several departments within the General Fund.

7.4. APPROVE THE PRICE INCREASE FROM \$ 47.77 TO \$ 50.79 PER TON FOR TRASH DISPOSAL WITH MAURY COUNTY SOLID WASTE WITH THE ESTIMATED FY23/24 COST BEING \$950,000 - PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT.

RECOMMENDATION: Approve.

INFORMATION: The City of Columbia Public Works Department utilizes Maury County Solid Waste for the disposal of residential trash. Due to an increase in the Consumer Price Index (CPI), the price for disposal of residential trash will increase from \$ 47.77 to \$ 50.79 per ton. The anticipated FY 23/24 cost for trash disposal with Maury County Solid Waste is \$950,000.

CERTIFICATION: The Chief Financial Officer certifies that \$950,000 is budgeted and unencumbered in Sanitation - General - Landfill Charge.

INFORMATION: The truck we currently have on order is not going to be built until the first quarter of 2024. There is a mandatory emissions change coming for 2024 and Navistar is moving

everything to the new state contract that went into effect 9/1/23 to cover the cost of the emissions change. Attached is a copy of the proposal for the new contract. The order could have been cancelled for no penalty as long as it was done before the 14th of September. After the 14th there's a \$5000 cancelation fee per order.

INFORMATION: On March 17, 2021, a Surety Guarantee in the amount of \$166,500 was deposited from LPT, LLC to ensure the completion of roads, striping, signage, drainage, grading and street lighting in Greystone Subdivision. At this time, LPT, LLC is

requesting preliminary acceptance for Greystone Subdivision. All applicable departments have inspected the development and the developer made all corrections to receive preliminary acceptance. The City will retain \$16,650 for a twelve-month period before City Council will be requested to accept this maintenance of roads and drainage. You are seeing the request because the developer chose to deposit funds rather than obtain a Letter of Credit.

7.10. APPROVE THE CERTIFICATION OF CITY OF COLUMBIA REAL AND PERSONAL PROPERTY TAX ASSESSMENTS FOR THE YEAR 2023 - CITY RECORDER'S OFFICE.

RECOMMENDATION: Approve.

INFORMATION: The City Recorder is certifying and submitting the City real and personal property tax assessments, for the year 2023, as assessed by Mr. Bobby Daniels, Maury County Tax Assessor.

The real estate property taxes are assessed at \$1,491,711,555 with tax revenue of \$12,308,158. Agricultural land taxes are assessed at \$5,735,975 with tax revenue of \$47,328. The personal property taxes are assessed at \$129,933,993 with tax revenue of \$1,072,085. The total tax revenue billed is \$13,427,571 and there are 22,146 tax notices. The City tax rate is \$0.8251 for each \$100 of assessed value.

7.11. APPROVE THE BID AWARD TO MGM TARGETS OF CALDWELL, IDAHO, FOR THE PURCHASE OF A 1200 SQUARE FOOT SIMUNITIONS PORTABLE SHOOTHOUSE IN THE AMOUNT OF \$70,799. - POLICE DEPARTMENT.

RECOMMENDATION: Approve.

INFORMATION: Bids were requested with MGM Targets of Caldwell, Idaho being the sole responder. The MGM Target Simunition Portable Shoot House is a non-ballistic training tool for adaptive urban environment training, building search, and clearing, as well as force-on-force training. MGM portable shoot House uses a simple assembly process that makes assembling, rearranging, and disassembling a house quick and easy. Within minutes, two users can have a training atmosphere assembled and ready to use. The simunition house is designed for use with simulated ammunition rounds, marking rounds and blanks. Allowing officers to experience live action training without the danger of live ammunition. The shoothouse will be placed and used at the Columbia Police Department firearms range.

RECOMMENDATION: Approve Ordinance No. 4476 as amended on second consideration.

INFORMATION: The proposed ordinance is the first amendment to the FY 2024 Appropriation Ordinance, impacting the State Street Aid, Drug, Sanitation, Capital Projects and Wastewater Funds and several departments within the General Fund.

Within this budget amendment, the following items are included:

- Reappropriation of funds totaling \$6,358,541 across General, State Street Aid, Sanitation, Capital Projects and Wastewater Funds.
- \$830,150 for CDBG Sidewalk Grant, \$44,086.27 for Tourism ARP Grant, \$200,000 to replenish General Fund reserves, \$699,999 in tourism enhancement funds, \$28,054 in Firefighter's Park reserves, \$675,790 to budget reserves/transfer to capital projects, and \$200,000 for Presidential Park in General City Admin.
